
Against the backdrop of the worsening climate crisis, the UN Secretary-General's Climate Ambition Summit aimed to showcase "first mover and doer" leaders from government, business, finance, local authorities, and civil society who came with credible actions, policies and plans – and not just pledges – to accelerate the decarbonization of the global economy and deliver climate justice in line with his Acceleration Agenda.

"If these first-doers and first-movers can do it, everybody can do it," the SecretaryGeneral said in his closing remarks, calling it a "Summit of Hope."

By demonstrating that tangible and ambitious action to credibly cut emissions and deliver climate justice was possible and practical, the Summit showcased a way forward: the alignment of sectoral, local, national and international plans and policies with credible and scienced-backed targets to accelerate decarbonisation, advance climate justice and fairness, with unprecedented levels of coordination and cooperation, and a renewed focus on credibility and accountability.

All of the above positions by United Nations is what inform need for maiden edition of this summit – an inclusive assembly of affected communities, individuals, government and private organisations.

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

CLIMATE CHANGE & HUMAN HEALTH

Change in weather and temperature poses many threats to the health and well-being of all persons in Abuja. This change, which is globally refer to as climate change. affects the food we eat, the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the places that provide us with shelter. Climate change can also impact people's health and well-being by altering the frequency or intensity of extreme weather events and spread of certain pests and diseases.

How Climate Change Affects Human Health

Climate change affects people's health in two main ways:

- By changing the seriousness or frequency of health problems that people already face.
- By creating new or unanticipated health problems in people or places where they have not been before.

The health effects of climate change include respiratory and heart diseases, pest-related diseases like Lyme disease and West Nile Virus, water- and food-related illnesses, and injuries and deaths. Climate change has also been linked to increases in violent crime and overall poor mental health.

Who's Most at Risk

All persons in Abuja face possible health impacts from climate change. However, certain groups are at more risk than others due to both climate and non-climate factors. For example, people living on floodplains, coastlines, or in areas prone to severe storms are more vulnerable to extreme weather. Those living in poverty may be less able to prepare for or respond to extreme events. As a result, these individuals are expected to have greater impacts from climate-related hazards.
